THE INAUGURATION OF TERRY BRITTON :: SIXTH PRESIDENT OF ROSE STATE COLLEGE - 9.13.07

Dr. Terry Britton was inaugurated as the sixth president of Rose State College on September 13, 2007, after more than a year of being on the job as president. "I look forward to being of service to this community and this college," he said. "It's the best place in the world."

Since 1972, Britton has worked in a variety of roles at the College. He began as an English instructor and within months of starting was chosen to serve as the director of the school's Learning Resources Center. He held that position for 17 years.

In 1991, Britton was named the school's vice president for Information Services. He served there until being promoted to vice president of Academic Affairs in 1996. He became executive vice president in 2000 and assumed the school's presidency after the June 2006 retirement of President James J. Cook.

It is the dream of the sixth president to turn Rose State College into the intellectual and artistic center of the surrounding community. Under President Britton's leadership, Rose State College's future is bright indeed.



RESULTS OF THE HIGHER LEARNING COMMISSION ACCREDITATION REVIEW ::

Rose State College welcomes this opportunity to share the insights from our intensive two-year process of self-study along with the results of the Higher Learning Commission report. Reaccreditation is essential to maintain the eligibility of our students for federal grants and loans as well as to ensure recognition of our associate degrees by employers, other higher education institutions, government agencies, professional licensing boards, and similar institutions. The formal process also helps the college focus on what we do well, what we can do better, and what we should plan for in the years ahead.

and distinctive, Rose State College is distinguished by its broad and deep relationship to its communities; its mission driven commitments to action and service; the evident dedication of its employees; and the stability of its executive and Board leadership. Based on the strength of the institution and the evidence presented under each of the five criteria indicating that core components are met and that there are no areas where Commission follow-up is warranted, the Team is recommending neither progress reports nor monitoring reports or visits. The Team recommends that the next comprehensive visit be scheduled for 2017-2018."

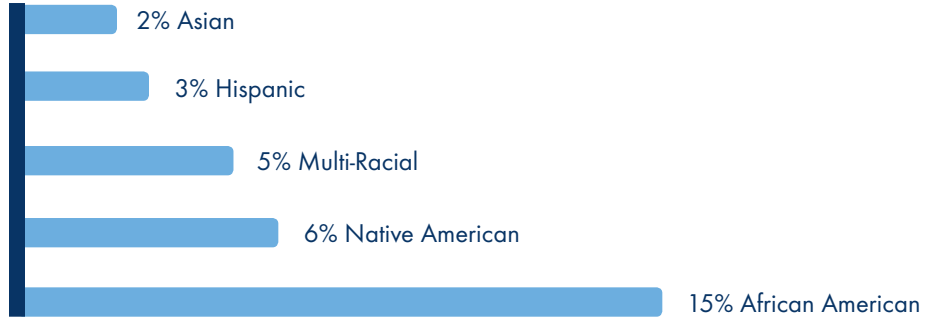
THE ACCREDITATION PROCESS

The accreditation process at Rose State began over two years prior to the site visit with the beginning of our inclusive and sustained self-study. The Vice Presidents for Academic Affairs and Student Affairs were selected in spring 2005 to co-chair the Steering Committee, comprised of numerous leaders of the College along with faculty. During the Fall 2006 Professional Development In-Service Meeting, we formally introduced the self-study process to the campus and announced the names of those who were to serve on the Campus Committee, which met monthly during the self-study process. Throughout the year, we also kept external constituencies and the Rose State College Board of Regents informed of the self-study process.

Our extensive analysis process culminated in the submittal of the 170 page Self-Study Report '07 to the Rose State College Board of Regents at their November 2007 meeting. Upon receiving their recommendation, the final version of the report was submitted to The Higher Learning Commission in January 2008. After hosting the team site visit in March of 2008, Rose State College received strong affirmation of its clearly meeting the Criteria for Accreditation, with no areas where follow-up is warranted or required.

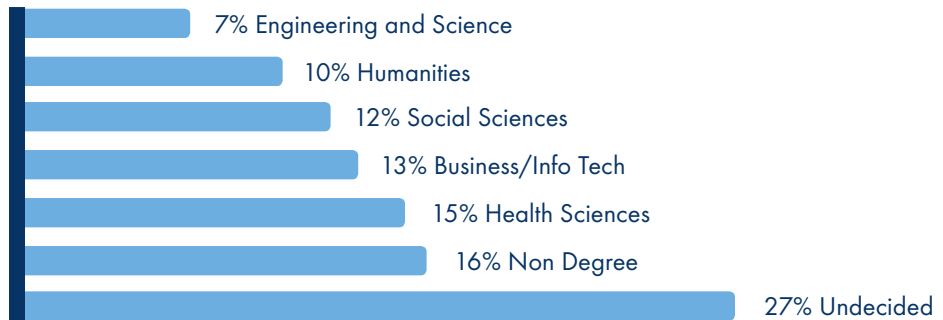
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:: ETHNIC DIVERSITY

*Data from Fall 2007 Semester

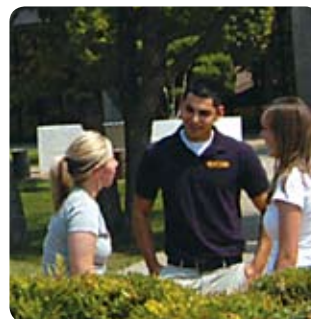
OVERVIEW OF ROSE STATE

On a brisk December morning in 1969, Virginia Rose, the widow of nationally-known educator Oscar Rose, began groundbreaking ceremonies for a new college in a wheat field east of Oklahoma City by opening a specially-constructed door labeled “Golden Opportunity.” In the less than 40 years, more than 225,000 students of all ages, from the immediate neighborhood and from as far away as Middle East military deployments, have passed through that golden door of educational opportunity provided by Rose State College.

Today, Rose State College is Oklahoma’s second largest, single-campus two-year college. We currently serve approximately 8,300 credit students each fall and spring, as well as approximately 6,500 continuing education students. Our students range in age from 17 to 60+; the average age is 28.

While many of our students come from our technical district and the metropolitan Oklahoma City area, others commute from rural areas in eastern and southern Oklahoma County as well as from smaller communities and rural areas of adjacent counties. In addition, our growth in distance education, particularly in online classes, has extended the area of our service even farther.

Rose State College students represent diversity in many ways. We serve urban, suburban, and rural students as well as students in ten state correctional institutions. Because of our proximity to Tinker Air Force Base, members of the military and their dependents make up slightly more than six percent of our student body. Our student population is also ethnically diverse.





THE HIGHER LEARNING COMMISSION SITE VISIT

In early March 2008, an evaluation team from The Higher Learning Commission, representing the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools, visited the Rose State College campus to complete the comprehensive evaluation required for continued accreditation. In addition to the review of the College's self study documentation, the team undertook the following activities:

- *Met with numerous individuals, including the president, members of the board of regents, vice presidents of academic affairs, students affairs, and business affairs, and the chief information officer;*
- *Met with numerous groups, including faculty, students, community members, deans and associate deans, the Institutional Effectiveness and Planning Council, the College Curriculum Committee, the Technology Advisory Committee, and the Assessment Committee;*
- *Reviewed over 100 documents, from the campus self study report to prospective student services plans and materials.*
- *Evaluated web site materials and initiatives, including distance learning, online courses, library materials, and various intranet items, including enrollment databases.*

Based upon the final site visit, the evaluation team issued a report addressing Rose State College's fulfillment of the 5 key criteria used to determine accreditation. Summary highlights are provided for each of these areas.

CRITERION ONE:: MISSION AND INTEGRITY

THE ORGANIZATION OPERATES WITH INTEGRITY TO ENSURE THE FULFILLMENT OF ITS MISSION THROUGH STRUCTURES AND PROCESSES THAT INVOLVE THE BOARD, ADMINISTRATION, FACULTY, STAFF, AND STUDENTS.

- ➔ Since its last reaccreditation in 1998, Rose State has reflected on and thoughtfully revised its mission documents to specify its commitments to community service, life-long learning and diversity.
- ➔ In its governance and administrative structure, RSC encourages effective leadership and collaboration in the carrying out of its mission. The Regents provide leadership by example in word and action, connecting the College to the community and supporting the learning of students by their involvement in the Foundation.
- ➔ Focus on the learner at the heart of the institution is reflected in planning at all levels and, more significantly, in the consciousness of everyone from the Regents to employees at every level.

CRITERION TWO:: PREPARING FOR THE FUTURE

THE ORGANIZATION'S ALLOCATION OF RESOURCES AND ITS PROCESSES FOR EVALUATION AND PLANNING DEMONSTRATE ITS CAPACITY TO FULFILL ITS MISSION, IMPROVE THE QUALITY OF ITS EDUCATION, AND RESPOND TO FUTURE CHALLENGES AND OPPORTUNITIES.

- ➔ Rose State College has effective processes and mechanisms at multiple levels for purposes of planning.
- ➔ The College has responded to the changes and challenges related to economic development as evidenced in part by extensive training for business and industry, the Oklahoma Small Business Development Center (OSBDC), and many specialized programs for Tinker. The College is nimble and flexible in introducing and adapting credit and noncredit instruction as well as student and community services. The strength of the connectedness of the College to its community is unique and remarkable.
- ➔ The College has maintained its fiscal health as reflected in both operating and capital budgets. A careful review of budgets, audits, grants and contracts testifies to the solid financial position of the College. The College has aggressively and successfully sought alternative revenues through grants and contracts and benefits immensely from the support of its Foundation.
- ➔ The allocation of resources at Rose State College is effectively focused on the learning of students.

3 CRITERION THREE:: STUDENT LEARNING AND EFFECTIVE TEACHING

THE ORGANIZATION PROVIDES EVIDENCE OF STUDENT LEARNING AND TEACHING EFFECTIVENESS THAT DEMONSTRATES IT IS FULFILLING ITS EDUCATIONAL MISSION.

→ The College goals for student learning outcomes are clearly stated for individual courses, programs, and general education at Rose State College. Rose State College has maintained a consistent focus on assessing student learning at the entry level (placement testing), mid-level (general education) and program level.

→ Excellence in teaching is valued and supported at Rose State. Full-time and adjunct faculty members are recognized with Annual Excellence in Teaching Awards and stipends.

→ The College's focus on teaching is recognized by students and community members. Students spoke to the Team about the faculty's extraordinary efforts to help them learn. Mathematics and Science faculty work together on a volunteer basis as the "Dare to Dream Team" providing instructional support to math and science teachers in surrounding area school systems. The local school superintendent spoke about the willingness of Rose State's faculty to work closely and cooperatively with teachers throughout the K-12 system, and the Team was provided many examples of Rose State faculty's close working relationship with faculty at area universities.

- There is clear evidence that Rose State College (RSC) has assimilated the value of life-long learning throughout the institution.
- The institution supports professional development opportunities and makes them available for all.
- The College demonstrates a commitment to lifelong learning through the initiatives of the Corporate Relations and Workforce Education Division and the Professional Training and Education Center. In a meeting with community leaders, the Team learned of numerous collaborative ventures and of Rose State's willingness to respond to their needs.
- Student groups identified learning outcomes, and the students were able to articulate how they were effectively prepared for continued learning and development of intellectual inquiry. Students indicated that they are challenged in each of their classes to think critically on exams, projects, and papers.
- The College has incorporated as part of its mission, a focus: "...through programs and services [on] a diverse community." The College sponsors the Global Oklahoma Festival, an annual event celebrating diverse cultures. The thirty student clubs, organizations, as well as intercollegiate and intramural sports offer a diverse array of opportunities for students to become involved and experience college life.
- Service-learning activities offered in many courses across many disciplines as well as through club and organization activities demonstrate the linkages between the curricular and co-curricular activities which support inquiry, practice, creativity, and social responsibility. In addition, the art, music and theatre programs/productions provide opportunities for students to practice their creative skills and contribute to the appreciation of the fine arts as well as to advancing the common good. 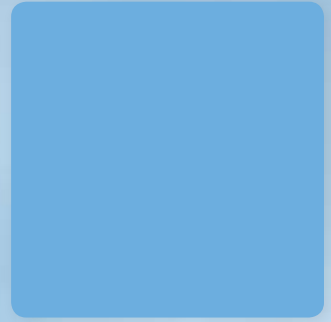
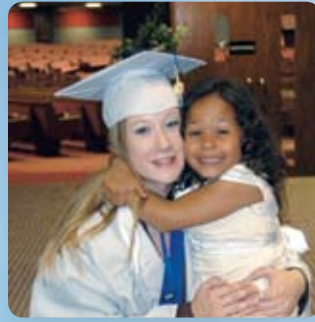
- Responsiveness and willingness to meet the learning needs of the community have determined the College's development of programs, services, and facilities.
- Partnerships that benefit both the College and the community abound. The long-standing partnerships with Tinker Air Force Base are clear evidence of the symbiotic relationship between the two organizations.
- The growth of the College facilities and expansion of programs have been and promise to continue to be responsive to and anticipatory of the needs of the community.
- The culture of engagement of Rose State with Midwest City, Del City and the greater Oklahoma City area is everywhere evident. Service-learning, embraced by the College as a core value, is embedded in curricular and co-curricular activities.
- The Adopt-a-School and Dare to Dream programs are valued by those served and those serving. The College also accommodates a University Center facility opened in 2006 in cooperation with the University of Central Oklahoma which affords access to baccalaureate completion programs in Nursing and Business Administration on its campus.

→ The College's connectedness to the community is reinforced by the length of service of many Rose employees, many of whom have spent and are spending their working lives at the College while at the same time being active members of the community. The unprecedented affirmation of bond issues is an example of the communities' trust and confidence in the College, enabling the College to continue to carry out its mission in good times and in hard times as well.

→ The representatives of the community who met with the Team described Rose State College as "the hub of the community," and "the heart of the community" where faculty and staff who really care help students learn in an environment where the students can gain confidence as they build competence. The students who graduate from the College are sought after as employees in the fields of health, public safety and countless others. Students have a competitive advantage over those at 4 year schools because of the nurturing environment where their individual learning needs are met and where they are names in classes of 25 instead of a student who is one of a number among 525. One of the community members observed that there is no great community without great education, and his words echoed those of one of the Regents—"Rose is a jewel, a gem."

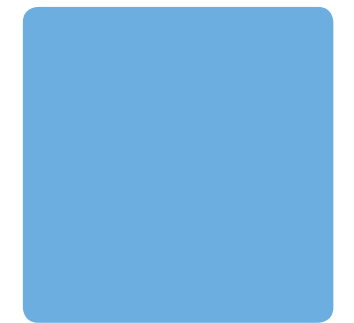

ROSE STATE MAKES SIGNIFICANT ECONOMIC IMPACT ::

OVER \$480 MILLION SOCIETAL IMPACT

In order to provide a quantitative perspective on the economic contribution of the most current group of students, we turned to a report titled *The Socioeconomic Benefits of 14 Community College Districts in Oklahoma*, sponsored by the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education and authored by Dr. M. Henry Robison and Dr. Kjell A. Christophersen of CCbenefits, Inc.

Based on the total credit hours taken annually by Rose State students, the total societal impact comes to over \$480 million. Of that, 84 percent or \$404 million is due to increased earnings over the students' lifetime. These figures apply to just our current annual number of students. Imagine what the impact has been since our founding in 1970.



COMMUNICATIONS CENTER / PERFORMING ARTS THEATRE CELEBRATES TEN-YEAR ANNIVERSARY ::

Rose State College observed the 10th anniversary of the opening of the Communications Center/Performing Arts Theatre in 2008. With the help of a state bond issue and funding raised with the generous support of the College's technical education district, the Communications Center officially opened on March 4, 1998. With the subsequent partnership formed with the Civic Center Music Hall, the College has brought top name entertainers, theater and musical events to the community.

From 1998-2001, the Communications Center was home to the Oklahoma City Philharmonic. Their presence helped introduce the facility to all of the Metro area. Nationally known entertainers have included The Temptations, Buck Owens, Roy Clark, John Kay and Steppenwolf, Three Dog Night, Frankie Avalon, Hal Holbrook in his awarding winning performance as Mark Twain, comedian Bill Cosby, entertainer Willie Nelson, and singer/actress Shirley Jones, just to name a few.

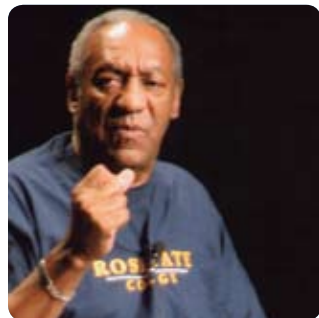
The community has used the center for various events such as beauty pageants, science fairs, graduations, inaugurations, political debates, musical theater, dance recitals, band concerts, seminars, career fairs, dinners, award presentations, dramatic plays, and art exhibits. Rose State College has, of

course, hosted many of its own events in the theater as well, including Global Oklahoma, the Miss Rose State College/Miss Black Rose State College pageants, and its recent theatrical production of "Big River." It also hosts the annual Oklahoma Student Invention Convention, which brings together inspiring young inventors from around the state.

NETWORKING FOR SUCCESS

In an ongoing effort to positively impact the next generation of students, the Foundation changed the format of the Annual Recognition Dinner. Held September 17, 2007, "Networking for Success" was a chance for donors to interact with students and discuss topics related to career, life, family, and friends. After an evening with 50 outstanding community leaders, the 47 Foundation scholarship recipients who attended made numerous contacts and went away empowered by their interactions. Sponsors included BancFirst, Imperial, Sysco Foods, Buddy's Produce, and Commercial Linen.

TINKER FEDERAL CIVIC LEADERS SCHOLARSHIP

Tinker Federal Credit Union approved \$20,000 in annual funding for the Tinker Federal Civic Leaders, a Rose State College scholarship program to build leaders from Eastern Oklahoma County and Tinker Air Force Base. The first cohort group of 10 students was selected for the 2008-09 academic year. It is the first RSC scholarship focused on Tinker Air Force Base military spouses as well as the adult student population in Eastern Oklahoma County.

STATE REGENTS ENDOWMENTS

The Rose State College Foundation currently has seven endowments invested through the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education: the Croak, Hudiburg, Hardin, Atkinson, and Excellence in Teaching and Learning Endowments; and the Howell and Reynolds Lectureships. Earnings of \$107,400 were utilized in accordance with the provisions of the endowments to provide an extra measure of excellence to programming for the College.

INTERNAL FUND DRIVE

During a one-month internal fundraising drive, the College increased its percentage of monthly payroll donors among faculty and full-time staff from 29 percent to 62 percent, with 121 new donors coming on board. Faculty and staff contributions total more than \$35,000 per year. The Professional and Administrative Staff Association (PASA) had the largest increase in 2008, with 93 percent of their members currently donating to the Foundation on a monthly basis. A campus-wide celebration for both the internal drive and College's successful accreditation visit was held May 1.
